

Free mobile COVID-19 testing offered in Anna

Southern Seven Health Department scheduled free mobile COVID-19 testing events in Anna and Vienna. Testing was offered Tuesday, Dec. 29, at Southern Seven's Union County clinic in Anna. Vehicles were lined up early Tuesday morning at the clinic, located along Lick Creek Road, for the free testing, which began at 8 a.m. Testing also is scheduled from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 3, in Vienna. The testing will be offered at Southern Seven's Early Learning Center, which is located at 513 E. Vine St. in Vienna.

Southern Seven Health Department offers mobile testing in Anna, Vienna

Southern Seven Health have been tested. Department has scheduled free mobile COVID-19 testing events in Anna and Vienna.

Testing was offered Tuesday, Dec. 29, at Southern Seven's Union County clinic in Anna.

Testing also is scheduled from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 3, in Vienna. The testing will be offered at Southern Seven's Early Learning Center, which is located at 513 E. Vine St. in Vienna.

The health department said the free nasal swab test is quick and easy, with results available in as little as three days.

Anyone needing a CO-VID-19 test, even those without symptoms, can be tested without an appointment or doctor's referral.

The Illinois Department of Health and Southern Seven Health Department

are hosting these events. Since September, Southern Seven Health Department has held 13 mobile COVID-19 testing events in each of the seven counties the department serves. More than 1,000 people

As the virus continues to sweep across the region, Southern Seven Health Department encourages all residents to get tested regardless of symptoms, especially if they have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive.

The health department said in a news release that it "is through testing that the health department can effectively track this disease and prevent its spread to our most vulnerable populations."

Residents who are unable

to be tested on these dates are asked to watch for these symptoms: Fever or chills, cough,

shortness of breath, fatigue, body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, and diarrhea.

The impact of the ongoing coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic has been the major story of 2020. In August, a message for the time of a pandemic was shared on a sign at Mt. Moriah Lutheran Church

That brings the total CO-

VID-19 deaths in Illinois to 16,074 among 942,362 cases and more than 13 million test results reported.

The IDPH on Monday reported 4,453 new confirmed and probable cases of COVID-19 in Illinois.

Statewide, the rolling seven-day average case positivity rate from Dec. 21 to Dec. 27 was 7.2 percent.

That is three-tenths of a percentage point lower than the seven-day average case positivity rate reported on Dec. 23, the last day IDPH released COVID data before the holiday weekend. That makes one week of rates below 8 percent.

At the end of Sunday, there were 4,243 people hospitalized with COV-ID-19 in Illinois, a decrease of 350 from Dec. 23.

There were 884 intensive care beds in use by COV-ID-19 patients as of Sunday night, a decrease of 69 from Dec. 23. That left 840, or just over 25 percent, of ICU beds available statewide.

COVID-19 patients occupied 515 ventilators, a decrease of 21 from the Wednesday prior to the holiday weekend.



The coronavirus/CO-VID-19 pandemic has had an ongoing major impact on small businesses throughout the Union County area.

Some of those businesses are receiving some help as they head into the new year of 2021.

The Anna City Council in mid-December voted to waive nearly all of the Union County municipalities liquor license fees.

The city council approved Resolution 2020-46 at its regular meeting on Dec. 15. The agenda for the meeting noted that the resolution provides for the temporary waiver of fees for certain classifications of city liquor licenses.

On Sunday, President Trump signed a bill granting \$900 billion in CO-VID-19 aid, which includes a direct payment up to \$600 dollars to some Americans. The bill also includes funds for vaccine distribution and boosts in weekly unemployment benefits.

County commissioners meet Dec. 23

The Union County Board levied by local businesses Carol Hoffman, Ken Pinof Commissioners met in regular session Wednesday morning, Dec. 23.

All five of the county board members were present. The meeting was held at the Union County Courthouse in Jonesboro.

Due to limitations which are in place for the region in response to the ongoing coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic, the Dec. 23 meeting was not open to the public.

The meeting was recorded live and can be viewed online on the "County of Union, Illinois" YouTube page. As of early this week, the recording had been viewed about 40 times.

In business at last week's meeting:

New county commissioner Darryl Harvell was appointed to two committee posts.

Harvell will represent the commissioners on the Union County Hotel Operators Occupancy Tax Board, which unofficially is referred to as the tourism board.

The county' notes that the "Hotel Operators' Occupancy Tax Board was established by the board of commissioners to develop an application process for those seeking the dollars generated by the county's occupancy tax and to make recommendations on what projects to fund.

"While the Union County Board of Commissioners retains the final say on grant applications, the intention is to rely heavily on the individual expertise of the Tourism Board's members."





May 2020: Anna VFW hosts Memorial Day service

Monday morning, May 25, for a Memorial Day service which was hosted by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Carroll P. Foster Post No. 3455 of Anna.

The guest speaker at Monday morning's ceremony was Clay W. Mitchell, U.S. Army (retired), who is vice commander of the Anna VFW post.

Mitchell's address follows:

Good morning to my brothers and sisters in the VFW, the VFW auxiliary, and the proud Americans of our great Union County community.

Thank you all for taking time out of your day to stand with us in recognition and honor of all those who have gone before us, who were willing to make the ultimate sacrifice in service to this nation.

We are humbled by their sacrifices and we commend their expressions of courage and strength that they showed throughout the years as our nation called.

The community gathered mourned, are missed, and their absences left empty spaces in many lives.

Some, who have never suffered losses like this, may not see the empty spaces left in the families and commu-

That's simply human nature, but as FDR (Franklin Delano Roosevelt) once said, "Those who have long enjoyed such privileges as we enjoy, forget in time, that men have died to win them."

It was Southern Illinois' own General John A. Logan, then a leader of an organization of Union Civil War veterans, who in May 1868, called for a nationwide day of remembrance.

His request read: "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land.'

It wasn't until 1968 that Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Our brothers and sisters Day as the last Monday in

Memorial Day is also around the graves of those associated with the poppy. Why the poppy? Well, in World War I, just after the Second Battle of Ypres in Belgium in the spring of 1915, a surgeon for an artillery unit named John McCrea was inspired by

who died at Ypres.

For a burial service he wrote a poem from the perspective of a dead soldier. A soldier buried in Flanders, Belgium in a grave covered in wild poppies.

John McCrea's poem, "In Flanders Fields," goes like this:

In Flanders fields, the poppies blow

Between the crosses, row

That mark our place; and in the sky

The larks, still bravely singing, fly

Scarce heard amid the

guns below. We are the Dead. Short

We lived, felt dawn, saw

sunset glow, Loved and were loved,

and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with



MADD commemorates 20th anniversary of signing of .08 **BAC** national standard into law

nificant milestone as Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) celebrated the 20th anniversary of President Bill Clinton signing the .08 BAC national standard into law.

The bill was signed in the White House Oval Office with MADD's then national President Millie Webb, whose family was devasted by a .08 BAC drunk driver, and several other MADD victims.

The .08 BAC law remains one of MADD's most significant legislative achieve-

"When my family was hit by a .08 BAC driver, killing my 4-year old daughter Lori and my 19-month-old nephew Mitch, and injuring me, my husband Roy and my unborn child Kara, it was not considered a crime," Webb recalled.

"While I was waiting with President Clinton to walk out to the Rose Garden ceremony, I told him my job was to just introduce him and not share my story, but I wanted him to know what this day meant to me and so many other .08 victims.

"I told him that when I found out Mitch and later on Lori had died and were already buried, because of my burns I couldn't even raise my hand to wipe my tears. And tears were like salt to an open wound.

"He took my hand and said, 'Millie, that's what the world needs to hear.'

"And so I told a little bit about my story and I'll never forget that. It is our stories that give MADD so much power to make change.

"MADD was proud to work with Congressional champions like the late Sen. Frank Lautenberg, former Rep. Frank Wolf, Rep. Nita Lowey and many others on getting this bill through.

"We were also proud to work with former U.S. Department of Transportation Secretary Rodney Slater, who led the administration's initiative in support of .08 BAC.

Today, the .08 BAC national standard remains the law of the land.

"We have made tremendous strides in reducing the

Driving after drinking

Driving after drinking is deadly. Yet it still continues to happen across the United

If you drive while impaired, you could get arrested, or worse: be involved in a traffic crash that causes serious injury or death.

Approximately one-third of all traffic crash fatalities in the United States involve drunk drivers (with BACs of .08 g/dL or higher).

In 2017, there were 10,874 people killed in these preventable crashes.

In fact, on average over the 10-year period from 2006-2016, more than 10,000 people died every year in drunk-driving crashes.

In every state, it's illegal to drive with a BAC of .08 or higher, yet one person was killed in a drunk-driving crash every 48 minutes in the United States in 2017.

Men are more likely than women to be driving drunk in fatal crashes.

In 2017,21 percent of men were drunk in these crashes, compared to 14 percent for women.

deaths and injuries since MADD's founding 40 years ago, thanks to the tireless dedication of many victims and leaders who have fought hard for lifesaving laws like .08," said MADD national president Helen Witty.

"With 10,000 people still killed every year in preventable drunk driving crashes, we continue to work toward the elimination of this crime with Congress to pass legislation to require advanced drunk driving prevention technology in all vehicles. This technology would save 9,400 lives each year when fully implemented."

MADD national president Helen Witty, whose 16-yearold daughter Helen Marie was killed by an alcohol- and marijuana-impaired driver, said that "every single drunk driving death is preventable. Every single drunk driving death forever leaves an empty seat at the table," Witty said.

Drunk driving crashes increase dramatically every holiday season as more

people travel and celebrate. More than 1,000 people died in drunk driving crashes from 6 p.m. on Thanksgiving Eve through New Year's Eve

Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve are so dangerous that almost half of all traffic deaths on those days are caused by drunk driving.

In addition to planning ahead for a safe and sober ride home, MADD encourages party hosts to reward nondrinking, designated drivers with festive, non-alcoholic drinks and good food.

Thank law enforcement heroes and support them in any way you can.

Show your support for MADD's long-running Tie One On For Safety campaign and remind everyone that drinking and driving never mix by displaying one of MADD's iconic red ribbons on your vehicle.

"We want everyone to have a fun, festive holiday season," Witty said. "We also want everyone to make it home."

Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) in G/DL Typical Effects, Predictable Effects on Driving

Concentration

.02. Some loss of judgment; relaxation, slight body warmth, altered mood. Decline in visual functions (rapid tracking of a moving target), decline in ability to perform two tasks at the same time (divided attention).

.05. Exaggerated behavior, may have loss of small-muscle control (e.g., focusing your eyes), impaired judgment, usually good feeling, lowered alertness, release of inhibition. Stopping without cause or erratic braking. Drifting in and out of traffic lanes.

Signaling that is inconsistent with driving actions. Slow response to traffic signals (such as a sudden stop or delayed start).

Straddling the center lane marker. Driving with headlights off at night.

Swerving. Driving slower than 10 mph below the speed limit. Turning abruptly or illegally. Driving into opposing traffic on the wrong side of the road.

Individuals authorized to use cannabis must be 18 years of age or older, registered with the Department of Public Health and must secure a written certification from a physician licensed in Illinois.

The Department of Public Health will issue a registry identification card and a notation will be made on the registrant's Illinois driving record.

A driver may not operate a motor vehicle while under the influence of cannabis prescribed for medicinal purposes and may not transport medicinal cannabis in a vehicle unless it is stored in a tamper-evident container and kept in an area that is inaccessible while the vehicle is in motion.

If a police officer stops a vehicle driven by a person who holds a medical cannabis registry card and the officer has reasonable suspicion to believe the person is impaired by the use of cannabis, the driver must submit to field sobriety testing.

Refusal to submit to testing or failure of the field sobriety tests will result in the suspension of the person's driver's

Driving while impaired by the use of cannabis, or driving with an open container may result in the loss of driving privileges, as well as the revocation of the driver's medical cannabis card.

In addition to alcohol and cannabis, many prescription and nonprescription drugs impair safe driving

Make Right Decision, know how to stay safe

You've made the right decision to not drive impaired, now the next step is finding a safe way home.

Before you pick up your phone to book a driver or call a taxi, it's important that you know how to stay safe.

Ride-Sharing, Ride-**Hailing and Taxis**

Confirm your ride by checking the license plate.

Before getting into a ridehailing vehicle, make sure the car and license plate match what you booked through the app. Many of these cars can look alike.

You should also look at the driver and ask them their name, to confirm it matches the name and photo in the app.

Find a Safe Spot to be Picked Up

Pick up locations for ridehailing services aren't usually centralized.

You should pick a location where you can wait inside until the driver arrives.

If that's not possible, choose an area to wait that's away from the roadway, well

Request that your driver drop you off in a safe spot too.

Don't step into the road to flag down a ride. Go to a taxi stand, call for a cab or request someone call a ride for you.

It's never a good idea to accept a ride from a stranger who may stop after seeing you looking for a ride.

Wear a Seat Belt

Even if it's a quick ride and you're in the back seat, you should always buckle up, and make sure that your driver wears their seat belt, too.

Bikes and Scooters

Don't ride a bike or scooter after drinking alcohol or using drugs.

About 26 percent of the bicyclists who died in 2017 had been drinking. Even a small amount of alcohol can cause balance issues and delayed reaction time.

If you're impaired, leave the bike or scooter behind, and choose a safe form of transportation.

An estimated 32 percent of deadly pedestrian crashes in 2017 involved a person who was drunk and walking. Avoid walking home if you've been drinking or using drugs.

If you choose to walk, remember to obey traffic signs and signals. If there isn't a sidewalk, walk facing traffic and as far from vehicles as

Be visible, especially at night: 75 percent of pedestrian deaths in 2017 happened when it was dark.

Public Transportation

Be vigilant. When using a bus or train to get home, be aware of your surroundings, especially if you're traveling alone. Choose a seat near the driver or operator. Don't sleep on a bus.

While it's best to plan ahead for a sober driver, or consider staying over, it's important to know how to stay safe when considering other forms of transportation. And remember, never drive drunk or high.

Alcohol reduces function of brain

Alcohol is a substance that reduces the function of the brain, impairing thinking, reasoning and muscle coordination.

All these abilities are essential to operating a vehicle

As alcohol levels rise in a person's system, the negative effects on the central nervous system increase, too.

Alcohol is absorbed directly through the walls of the stomach and small intestine.

Then it passes into the bloodstream where it accumulates until it is metabolized by the liver.

Alcohol level is measured

by the weight of the alcohol in a certain volume of blood.

This is called Blood Alcohol Concentration, or BAC. At a BAC of .08 grams of alcohol per deciliter (g/dL) of blood, crash risk increases exponentially.

Because of this risk, it's illegal in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico to drive with a BAC of .08 or higher.

However, even a small amount of alcohol can affect driving ability.

In 2017, there were 1,837 people killed in alcoholrelated crashes where drivers had lower alcohol levels (BACs of .01 to .07 g/dL).

BAC is measured with a breathalyzer, a device that measures the amount of alcohol in a driver's breath, or by a blood test.

Chronology of DUI arrest

From the Illinois Secretary of State's DUI Fact Book

An officer stops a vehicle at a roadside safety check or for probable cause, reasonable

suspicion or unusual operation.

The officer observes the driver and requests a driver's license, vehicle registration and proof of insurance.

If the officer suspects the driver is under the influence, the driver is asked to submit to field sobriety tests.

If the officer does not suspect the driver is under the influence, the driver is released without any applicable viola-

If the officer has probable cause based on the field sobriety tests, the driver is placed under arrest for DUI and taken to the police station. The driver is asked to submit to chemical testing of breath, blood, urine or other bodily substance.

If tested, the driver who has a BAC of more than .05 but less than .08, a THC of less than either 5 nanograms or more per milliliter of whole blood or 10 nanograms or more per milliliter of other bodily substance, and no drugs found in his/her system, no statutory summary suspension will apply; however, the associated DUI charge will remain until appropriate action is taken by the court. If the driver refuses to

submit to or fails to complete chemical testing, a statutory summary suspension will be imposed. If the driver is a firsttime DUI offender, he/she may be eligible for a Monitoring Device Driving Permit. If the driver is a repeat DUI offender, he/she may be eligible for a Restricted Driving Permit (RDP).

If the driver's test results show a BAC of .08 or more; a THC of either 5 nanograms or more per milliliter of whole blood or 10 nanograms or more per milliliter of other bodily substance; or any trace of a drug (other than cannabis), illegal substance or intoxicating compound, the driver will be issued a law enforcement sworn report notifying the driver of a statutory summary suspension.

If the driver's license is valid, a receipt is issued, allowing driving for 45 days.

Drivers may obtain additional testing at their own expense; the results are admissible in court.

The offender is required to post bond and may be detained until bond is posted.





In Illinois, a driver is legally considered to be under the influence if he/she has a blood-alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or more, has used any illegal substance, or is impaired by medication A driver's BAC is based on the ratio of alcohol to blood or breath. However, an individual with a BAC between .05 and .08 may be convicted of DUI if

How many drinks before I'm at .08? The effect of alcohol on an individual is determined primarily by two factors: the amount of alcohol the body. Other contributing factors include gender body weight, alcohol tolerance, mood, environment, and the amount of food consumed.

From the first drink, alcohol affects coordination and judgment. Even with a BAC well below .08, a person's reaction time slows. The risk of being in a crash begins to climb with a BAC between .04 and .05, and increases rapidly thereafter By the time a driver reaches a BAC of .06, he/she is





Leave No Trace course set at Touch of Nature

A Leave No Trace Master Education. Educator course is planned at Southern Illinois University Carbondale's Touch of Nature Environmental Center Jan. 12-16.

The immersive experience takes place at Touch of Nature, a 3,100-acre site about 8 miles south of Carbondale off Giant City Road.

Located along Little Grassy Lake, the experiential learning and nature facility is bordered by Giant City State Park and Crab Orchard National Wildlife Refuge.

Throughout the course, participants will get handson experience putting into practice what they are learning.

They will participate in on-site adventures and back-country day outings.

On the final day, each participant will present a 15- to 20-minute lesson on one of the Leave No Trace Seven Principles and how it relates to a specific activity.

Educators, naturalists, park rangers, recreation planners, Scout leaders and anyone who works in an outdoor setting or industry or who has an interest in the great outdoors will benefit from the class.

After successfully completing the class, participants will receive a certificate from the Leave No Trace Center for Outdoor

They will then be qualified to teach the two-day Leave No Trace Trainer courses as well as shorter Leave No Trace awareness workshops.

Touch of Nature's outdoor learning laboratory will incorporate overnight camping and indoor lodging for the course, and enhanced safety measures, including social distancing, will be in place.

In order to comply with COVID-19 safety guidelines set forth by the state of Illinois and SIU, meals and lodging are not included in the registration and group sizes are limited, but the registration cost has been adjusted accordingly.

Participants are advised to bring all necessary equipment and food.

Arrangements for rental equipment, food purchases or lodging at Little Grassy Lodge can be made with Touch of Nature in advance for additional fees.


Noah Franklin led Cobden with 28 points and 7 rebounds.

IDOA announces guidelines for use of Dicamba products

during 2021 growing season

The Illinois Department of Agriculture, IDOA, on Dec. 23 announced that it has registered the following Dicamba products for the use on soybeans for the 2021 growing season:

XtendiMax with Vapor Grip Technology, Engenia Herbicide and Tavium Plus Vapor Grip Technology.

The new federal label for Dicamba was issued by the United States Environmental Protection Agency on Oct. 27.

The new federal label requirements for these products include:

•Requiring an approved pH-buffering agent, also known as a volatility reducing agent, be tank mixed with Dicamba products prior to all applications.

•Requiring a downwind buffer of 240 feet and 310 feet in areas where listed endangered species are located.

Prohibiting application if the wind is blowing toward any Illinois Nature Preserves Commission site that is adjacent to the proposed field of application.

Prohibiting application when the wind is blowing toward an adjacent residential area.

"This decision was made The approved federal after evaluating several bel also includes a cutoff factors, including the reduction of pesticide misuse cases involving the use of Dicamba on soybeans from 2019 to 2020," said IDOA acting director Jerry Costello II.

"In 2020, the department included an 85 degree temperature restriction in addition to the June 20 cutoff date, resulting in an 80 percent decrease in Dicamba misuse complaints."

Dicamba is a herbicide commonly used on soybeans and cotton.

Illinois ranks first in the nation for soybean production, producing 532 billion bushels of soybeans per year. The July 30 cutoff date for application of these products on cotton will not be affected.

Jan. 26: Where will you Garden? Build a garden using whatever space you have. Learn about traditional garden plots, raised beds, salad tables, container gardening, growing vertically and more.



June 2020: Black Lives Matter protest held in Anna

Participants in the Black Lives Matter protest gathered late Thursday afternoon, June 4, in a municipal parking lot along East Davie Street in downtown Anna. An estimated 150 to 200 people participated in the peaceful

Hundreds of activists and onlookers from throughout the region gathered in downtown Anna during the late afternoon hours of Thursday, June 4, for a Black Lives Matter protest.

Demonstrators met at Anna City Park and marched a predetermined route to a municipal parking area on East Davie Street and then on to the Anna Police Station on Market Street.

Protesters waved signs and called chants throughout the event, which was punctuated by speeches from community members and group prayers with local religious leaders.

Numerous demonstrations have been held in the name of the Black Lives Matter movement throughout the country in recent weeks. Many of the events, like the one in Anna, have been peaceful protests.

The catalyst for the civil unrest was the death of George Floyd, a 46-yearold African American man who died while in police custody in Minneapolis, Minn., on May 25. Video footage of Floyd's death at police hands enflamed outrage when it appeared.

In the wake of the turmoil of the previous weeks, organizers of the protest in Anna worked with local police and government agencies to assure the safety of everyone in attendance and to help keep the protest peaceful.

Members of area law enforcement and emergency services maintained a visible presence at the event.

Anna Police Chief Bryan Watkins said that about 22 to 24 law enforcement personnel were on hand for the protest. Representatives of the Anna, Jonesboro and Cobden police departments, the Union County Sheriff's Office and Illinois State Police were present. Another 15 to 20 Illinois State Police personnel were on standby.

Watkins said he thought the outcome of the peaceful demonstration turned out better than most people might have expected. He said he hopes the community recognizes that a lot of work went into ensuring the peaceful outcome that was experienced at the demon-

Amiyah, an Anna resident who helped organize the event, said she was very pleased with the support she received from local law enforcement.

"They wanted to protect us they said, and they were, they were holding back the negative energy and making them go away during the protest" Amiyah said. "They've gained a lot of respect from this for sure."

Similar Black Lives Matter events occurred throughout the region. But the organizers of the Anna protest said they were particularly happy with the

"At an event at Mt. Vernon, we didn't have anywhere near this many active protesters. We had maybe fifty," said R.J., one of the leaders of the Anna protest "Seeing this many people coming out to be heard was definitely nice."

"I'm glad to say it was successful," said Amiyah. "I'm thankful for everyone who came out and showed love and support. We had a good crowd and a very LOUD one!"

Encouraging people to speak out against hate and abuse of minority groups was a core message of the protesters.


According to aviation technology company CAE's 2020-2029 Pilot Demand Outlook, starting in late 2021 there will be a short-term need for approximately 27,000 new professional pilots.

The demand is seen as continuing through the decade, as the industry is expected to require more than 260,000 new pilots.

Illinois solicits device donations for Computer Equity Network

Program seeks to provide free computers to low-income families

SPRINGFIELD — The state is soliciting computers and related equipment from individuals and companies as part of a new program announced Wednesday, Dec. 16, that will distribute refurbished devices to low-income households.

The Computer Equity Network is a collaboration between the state, the non-profit PCs for People, municipal governments and private businesses.

The program is tied to the ongoing Connect Illinois initiative based out of the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity that seeks to expand broadband access in the state.

Gov. JB Pritzker announced the program during his daily COVID-19 briefing on Dec. 16.

"One of the largest gaps made even more significant in this pandemic is the digital divide," Pritzker said.

"How can your child learn from home if you

don't have internet access? How can you shop for groceries safely online if you don't have a computer? Accessing the digital world has become essential for students, for small business owners, for patient-doctor communications, for job applications," the governor

"Really there's no realm in which connecting online hasn't become absolutely necessary in the modern era."

The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, DCEO, estimates that out of 4.9 million Illinois households, more than 1.1 million currently lack computer access in their home.

DCEO director Erin Guthrie said the Equity Network plans to host community hand-off events in all 102 Illinois counties to give away the upgraded devices to eligible families.

The events will also feature on-site support from DCEO to provide digital literacy courses and options for accessing low-cost internet services.

'We know that sourcing hardware is a limiting factor in this work, we are here today to call on Illinois companies to help us meet this challenge," Guthrie said.

"We are counting on you to maximize the impact of this initiative; your donation is essential as we work to close the gap."

Pritzker suggested that "in the spirit of this holiday season," Illinois companies, when upgrading equipment, can donate their old technology to the Equity Network, where PCs For People will upgrade it and give it to a family in need.

"It's all hands on deck. Employers large and small, and likewise governments large and small," Matt Schmit, the state's Office of Broadband Director, said in an interview

Colleges and other institutions of higher education that are upgrading equipment and can donate their older computers will be likely donors.

Counties, cities or even

"It can be computers by the hundreds or just a couple here and there. It all makes a difference," he said.

Companies and individuals who give computers to the program are eligible for tax reductions under applicable regulations for property donations to charitable organizations.

Current partners of the Equity Network include the Illinois COVID-19 Response Fund, the Jewish United Fund, the Girl Scouts of Southern Illinois, and the Urban League of Metropolitan St. Louis.

PCs for People CEO Casey Sorensen said the network has currently committed to providing 20,000 computers to low-income families during the non-profit's first year operating in Illinois. Given the state's number of house-

What's outside of the small towns are also en- holds lacking computers is more than one million, significant investment in the program from public, private and philanthropic entities will be necessary to source enough computers to meet the demand.

"It's easy for many to take for granted access to a computer and internet, but the pandemic has shown us millions of kids cannot access education," Sorensen said. "We have received the warm welcome from local corporations, and now with the governor's call to action, we're optimistic about announcing many new partnerships in the near future, that help us sustain supply


to reach Illinois families." Illinois residents who are eligible for free computers must be below 200 percent of the federal poverty line or enrolled in income-based government assistance programs such as free or reduced school lunch, Medicaid or SNAP.

Alongside the distribution events scheduled in every Illinois county, two statewide distribution centers, one in the Metro East area and one in Chicago,

will be open for donations. Households looking to receive computers, or companies looking to donate their older equipment, can visit Illinois.gov/ComputerEquityNetwork for more information.


















In strange, stressful year, many people turned to gardening for respite

gardening for respite.

Gardening increased 43 says. percent in 2020, according to a survey conducted by the Minnesota firm Axiom Marketing.

"A whole bunch of us got into, or more into, gardening in 2020," says University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator Richard Hentschel. "And, it looks like that trend may continue into 2021."

Extension educators and Master Gardeners helped many first-time home gardeners solve problems and source materials. Garden centers saw a boom in sales.

"Younger gardeners really embraced growing in their yards this year," Hentschel says.

Seventy-two percent of gardeners under 40 say that they spent more time gardening in 2020.

Renters of condominiums and apartments also grew gardens, with more than half of the respondents growing vegetables and one in three using container gardening.

The increase in vegetable gardening likely is due to concerns of food safety or

> In addition to vegetables, 73 percent of survey respondents grew flowers. "If you are going to be spending more time at home and in the yard, you want it to look good," Hentschel says.

Why did people garden in 2020? Top responses included creating a beautiful outdoor space, personal enjoyment and something to do.

About 82 percent said they were successful in their gardening endeavors.

"Some may have been first-time gardeners, or others may have taken on the challenge of a new type of gardening, or a new crop," Hentschel says.

The gardening push is expected to continue in 2021, with 86 percent indicating they'll garden the same amount or more next



Minimum wage set to go up in New Year

New Year with an additional increase in the minimum wage to \$11 an hour.

The Illinois Department of Labor is encouraging employees to watch their paychecks to ensure that time worked in 2021 is paid at the new rate.

Gov. JB Pritzker signed legislation into law in 2019 providing a path to a \$15 minimum wage by 2025.

Minimum wage earners received two increases in 2020 to \$9.25 an hour on Jan. 1 followed by an increase to \$10 an hour on July 1.

The minimum wage will continue to increase an additional \$1 an hour each January 1 until it reaches \$15 an hour in 2025.

"We want to make sure that workers earning minimum wage are aware that the \$1 increase should be reflected in their pay checks for any time they work after the first of the year," said Michael Kleinik, director of the Illinois Department of Labor, in a news release.

"While we fully expect employers will pay the new wage, we also want workers to be aware of the change."

Prior to the 2020 increases, the last time Illinois increased its minimum wage was more than a decade ago in 2010 when it was raised to \$8.25.

Cook County has a higher minimum wage than the The current city of Chicago minimum wage is \$13.50 an hour for small employers (four to 20 employees) and \$14 an hour for large employers (21 or more employees).

A recent study by the Illinois Economic Policy Institute at the University of Illinois indicated that more than 1.4 million adult hourly workers in Illinois make less than \$15 per hour.

The new law maintains provisions for employers to count gratuities to offset wages for workers such as food servers who regularly earn tips.

Tipped employees may be paid 60 percent of the hourly minimum wage. These workers must still earn the minimum wage after receiving tips or the employer must make up the difference.

Workers who are under

Illinoisans will ring in the state, currently \$13 an hour. 18 years old and work fewer than 650 hours in a year will earn a minimum wage of \$8.50 per hour beginning Jan. 1. The youth minimum wage rate will gradually rise to \$13 an hour by 2025.


All Illinois employers are required to post the "Your Rights Under Illinois Employment Laws" in a conspicuous location on the premises of the employer where notices to employees are customarily posted.

A holiday tradition: Pledge to buckle up and drive sober

With the holiday season underway, the Illinois Department of Transportation, IDOT, and Illinois State Police are reminding travelers to buckle up and drive sober as law enforcement agencies statewide ramp up their Click It or Ticket and Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaigns to ensure a safer holiday season.

"If traveling is necessary over the holidays, we urge the public to take some simple steps to help everyone reach their destinations safely," said Cynthia Watters, IDOT's bureau chief of safety programs and engineering.

"Buckling up is the best way to protect yourself, while driving sober is one of the easiest things you can do to protect others."

'Buckling up is the best way to protect yourself, while driving sober is one of the easiest things you can do to protect others.'

If you are celebrating with family and friends, you are urged to practice appropriate social distancing, keep gatherings to a minimum and wear a mask. For more guidelines from the Illinois Department of Public Health, visit dph.illinois.gov/covid19.

According to state crash data, three people died in three fatal crashes in Illinois last year between 6 p.m. on Dec. 24 to 11:59 p.m. on Dec. 25. Two were killed in crashes involving at least one driver who tested positive for alcohol.

As of Dec. 23, statistics showed 1,075 people had died on Illinois roads this year, compared to 972 at the same time a year ago.

Now through the early morning hours of Jan. 4, motorists will see hundreds of additional seat belt enforcement zones and other patrols aimed at keeping Illinois roads

"We remind everyone to ask themselves, first, is the travel essential, and, if it is, to please avoid the Fatal Four mistakes made by drivers: speeding, driving under the influence, distracted driving and failure to wear a seatbelt," said Illinois State Police director Brendan F. Kelly.

"While you're doing your part to protect your family by socially distancing, washing your hands, and wearing masks, help us protect our first responders by obeying the Move Over Law. We wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season."

The "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" and "Click It or Ticket" programs are funded with federal highway safety dollars administered by IDOT and done in conjunction with the Life or Death Illinois campaign, which was launched in 2018.
