Friday, Dec. 7, is Pearl Harbor Day.

Union County continues to close in on a total of 5 feet of precipitation for the year. The total through the end of November was 58.58 inches of rain.

As the paper was being put together Tuesday afternoon, light snow was falling in Anna.

In the "the forecast probably has changed by now" category, the National Weather Service office in Paducah reported on Tuesday morning that "periods of snow are forecast mainly over the southern half of the region Friday evening through Sunday evening. At this time, there remains considerable forecast uncertainty, making it difficult to speculate on any accumulations and impacts."

The PAST organization of Union County and the Jonesboro Bicentennial Committee have donated several history books to the Jonesboro Library.

A Blue Christmas service is set for 2 p.m. Friday, Dec. 21, at the welcome center at the Cross of Peace welcome center on Bald Knob Mountain near Alto Pass. The service is for people who may be experiencing difficult times during the holiday season.

November: cold; autumn 'far from normal'

November was a cold month...and the region pretty much skipped autumn, the National Weather Service office in Paducah has reported.

November Weather

The weather service reported that Southern Illinois, Southeast Missouri and Western Kentucky experienced well below

November. Temperatures were

around 6 degrees below normal.

All but nine days had below normal temperatures in Paducah, where it was the coldest November since 2014.

Measurable snow fell on three straight days, from Nov. 13 through Nov. 15. A

normal temperatures during total of 2.3 inches fell.

On average, the first measurable snow doesn't occur until Dec. 22 in Paducah.

Warmer weather was experienced in the region during the Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

Precipitation was varied across the region. Most of Southeast Missouri into Southern Illinois was drier than normal.

experience a much earlier than normal snowfall, with amounts from the Nov. 14-15 event as high as 3 to almost 5 inches in portions

of Southern Illinois. In Union County, the high temperature for November was 66 degrees, which was recorded on Nov. 6. Precipitation for the month totalled 3.64 inches.

"Every day...you're making a difference in somebody's life," Osman said.


"You are saving lives. There can be no greater calling than saving lives," he added.

Fall Seasonal Summary

The weather service reported that temperatures in the region averaged near normal for the fall season, which was from Sept. 1 through Nov. 30.

The season was "far from normal," the weather service noted.

Weather during September and into the first 10 days of October was a continua-

tion of summer, with many record temperatures being established.

It was the warmest start to October on record, with highs well into the 80s and lower 90s.

'We flipped the switch abruptly, and for the most part, the rest of the fall season experienced below normal temperatures," the weather service reported.

Stretches of near record cold temperatures were experienced in the middle of October and during November.

"Typical highs in the 60s and 70s just weren't there this year; we experience about 43 to 44 days like this in a typical fall season. This year, we only experienced 31 days with high temperatures in the 60s or 70s (and) 30 days in Cape Girardeau."

The majority of the region experienced a wetter than normal fall. Most locations east of the Mississippi River finished 2 to 6 inches above the seasonal normal, with a few locations even wetter than that.

Most of the region doesn't typically experience measurable snow in the fall season, but it happened this year, with a system spreading wintry precipitation across the region Nov. 14 and Nov. 15.

Carbondale man pleads guilty to making false bomb threat

George Rita II, 42, of sage had come from South-Carbondale, pleaded guilty on Nov. 20 to making a false threat to blow up a military recruiting center in Carbondale.

The plea was reported in a news release issued by the U.S. Department of Justice's U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Illinois.

Rita had been named in a one-count indictment returned on July 11, charging him with intentionally conveying false information about a bomb threat, which is a federal offense.

According to the indictment, on June 28, Rita sent a threatening anonymous message to an FBI tip line in Clarksburg, W. Va., claiming that he was heading to a recruitment center to blow it up and that no one could stop him.

Although no location was originally given for the threatened recruitment center, the FBI was able to determine that the mes-

ern Illinois and ultimately tracked the source of the message to an IP address assigned to Rita's apartment, which is in close proximity to the U.S. Army Recruiting Office in Carbondale.

During his plea hearing, the defendant admitted sending the threatening message and confirmed the information discovered during the FBI's rapid response and investigation. Sentencing is scheduled

for Dec. 27. Rita, who is currently being held without bond, faces up to five years of supervised release, and a maximum fine of \$250,000.

Information leading to the charges against Rita was obtained in an investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, with assistance from the Carbondale Police Department and the United States

Donating to food drives gives back to community

Giving to a food drive is an easy way to give back to your community. There are a few key tips to consider when donating to a food

'The number one rule of donating food," according to Carol Erickson, SNAP ed educator for University of Illinois Extension, "only donate the food you would serve your family. It is tempting to clean out the pantry and donate food that has been in there for a while. No matter what your income is, everyone wants safe and healthy food."

Erickson recommends taking a closer look at the food that you give away.

Shelf stable foods like cereal, mixes, peanut butter, and canned fruits and vegetables have dates that warn the consumer when they are best "used by."

These foods are still safe after the date but the quality and flavor decreases.

Only donate food that is within a close proximity of the "used by" dates.

The exception to this rule is baby formula. It is not safe to donate baby formula that has exceeded this used by date.

Expiration dates are put on baking ingredients like yeast, baking powder, and cake mixes.

Again, this is not a safety issue but a quality issue. Do not donate foods that are past their expiration date.

Another food safety term that is often used is "sell by" or pull dates. They are used on perishable items like milk and cheese: foods not appropriate for a food drive.

Even if your food is within safe dates, take a close look at the packaging.

If a box is damaged or open, please throw it away. Do the same with dented or rusty cans.

After major food drives, food pantries spend time and money to dispose of damaged and contaminated food. Remember the rule: if you won't eat it, don't give it away.

Individuals and families who seek assistance for food want healthy options. More food pantries are trying to offer foods with reduced sugar and salt for individuals with special dietary needs. If you have family mem-

bers who have special dietary needs, consider purchasing additional food items that you can donate.

As you consider what food to donate, think about the different food groups represented in MyPlate: fruit, vegetables, grains, protein, and dairy.

Here are some healthy options for each food group:

Fruit: unsweetened applesauce, canned fruit in water/light syrup/100 percent juice, dried fruit, fruit pouches and 100 percent fruit juice.

Vegetables: 100 percent vegetable juice, low-sodium canned soups, noadded/low/reduced sodium canned vegetables and spaghetti sauce, dried or dehydrated vegetables.

Grains: cereal and oatmeal with 3 grams of fiber, whole grain bread, pasta, and tortillas, barley, cornmeal, brown and instant rice, whole grain crackers, whole grain flour, corn tortillas.

Protein: low-sodium canned beans, dried beans/ peas/lentils, unsalted or lightly nuts, canned tuna/ salmon/chicken in water, nut butters like peanut, almond, or cashew with less than 230 mg sodium and 4 grams of sugar/serving.

Dairy: shelf-stable milk, soy/almond/rice milk, powdered milk, baby formula.

Individuals and families who seek food assistance are appreciative of the food they receive at local food

Healthy and safe food donations can make a difference for some of your neighbors. As you select food to donate, remember only give food that you would put on the table for your family.

Costs are \$10 to tour one home, and \$40 to tour all of the homes.



Fresh, flavorful herbs can be grown indoors

While winter can give gardeners a nice break from their usual garden maintenance, they undoubtedly miss the ability to harvest and enjoy the fresh garden at least six hours of direct

"Grow fresh, flavorful herbs indoors this winter to add some green to your home and zest to your recipes," says Brittnay Haag, a University of Illinois Extension horticulture edu-

Herbs grown in your home can be started from seeds or transplants from a garden center.

When growing herbs indoors, use well-drained potting soil and at least a 6-inch-diameter container with a drainage hole.

To ensure the plants do not get leggy and spindly, high levels of light are necessary.

Most herbs will need sunlight. Plants can also be grown under fluorescent lighting for 12 to 14 hours a day, located 6 to 12 inches above the plant.

Plants grown in natural light should be rotated every few days to allow for even plant growth.

Temperatures and humidity around the plants should be monitored to allow for adequate growth.

Optimal growing temperatures should remain between 60 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit.

Like any plant grown inside a house, avoid growing plants near heat vents which may dry out the plant.

One way to increase the humidity around the plants is to place the pots on a shallow tray of pebbles and water. A small fan in the room can provide adequate air circulation to avoid the spread of disease.

Herbs should be watered according to the requirement of the plant. Some, such as rosemary, should never be allowed to completely dry out; while others, such as sage, prefer the soil to be dry, but not so dry that the leaves wilt, before watering again.

Herbs should be fertilized every two weeks with a liquid fertilizer, following directions on the manufacturer label. Over-fertilizing herbs can result in decreased aroma and taste.

Just like herbs grown in the garden, trim the plants often to keep plants compact and to prevent flowering, which will decrease the flavor of the herb.



Of course, we should continue to be grateful that this is not our fate, but it seems to me that we are obligated to contribute in some way to transforming these violent areas into more peaceful situations where widows and orphans are grieved and are far from "normal" in this or any other society.

We have just celebrated Thanksgiving and are already preparing for Christmas, where we traditionally focus on the giving and receiving of gifts and the joy of the holidays with extended time with our families.

In the midst of these celebrations, we should not lose sight of our obligation and our opportunity to extend the same opportunities to peoples who do not enjoy them as

Before the many well meaning charities around our homes and families have concluded their work for this year, seek an opportunity to share our many blessings with those who can scarcely imagine the peace, prosperity and bounty that we know as normal.

Pullback erases stock market gains for year

(Phillip McGrath with Edward Jones shared the following commentary from investment strategist Kate Warne, which puts the current market volatility in perspective.)

The recent (mid-November) slide has brought the stock market back to where it started 2018. Looking back further for better perspective, the S&P 500's return (including dividends) was 5.2 percent over the past year and 10.6 percent per year on average over the past five years.

Although pullbacks are disappointing, they're not unusual. In our view, this one isn't a sign of problems to come. Instead, it shows investors are resetting their expectations to reflect slower economic and earnings growth next year.

Retailers add to market worries. Disappointing earnings reports from some major retailers added to concerns about technology growth rates and the rising risks of trade and tariff disruptions. But consumers remain optimistic, and retail sales rose faster than expected in October. Better wage growth and lower oil prices mean consumer spending should stay healthy, helping power solid economic growth.

Slower earnings growth ahead. Companies in the S&P 500 have reported earnings growth of about 25 percent for the past three quarters. But as the impact of the corporate tax cut and stronger economic growth fades, earnings are likely to rise less than 10 percent in 2019. That's still above average, but we expect more volatility ahead as investors adjust.

Tech gives back some gains. Fast-growing technology stocks have been among those with slower expected growth rates, and as a result, technology stocks have given back some of this year's gains. Technology was the bestperforming sector of the S&P 500 over the past five years and one of the best this year.

Trade negotiations add volatility. Trade and tariff progress is likely to be slow, but we expect negotiations will resolve many of the issues that have prompted the trade war with China. That's why we think there could be more trade-related volatility ahead and signs of progress would be positive for stocks.

Outlook is solid, but slower

We think this return to normal volatility is typical of the later part of the economic cycle, but it doesn't mean the cycle is near its end.

In our view, the outlook is for slower economic and earnings growth, which can extend the cycle further and support rising stock prices over time. Market volatility tends to rise during times of greater uncertainty and when the expectations are changing.

Owning the right mix of stocks and bonds based on your comfort with volatility and goals can help you keep a long-term perspective and stay invested during pullbacks.
