Anna city officials frustrated by street issues
Anna city officials again have voiced their frustration about a lack of progress in the Union County community munity.
The concerns were voiced at a regular meeting of the Anna Cly Council which was held Tuesday evening, Sept. 18. The meeting was at Anna City Hal
One of the concerns
about streets which was about streets which was discussed at the meeting focused on flooding which
occurs in the 500 block of occurs in the 500 block of East Vienna Street. The location frequently floods when heavy rains fall on the Union County area.
Flooding at the location occurred less than 24 hours after the city council's Sept. 18 meeting.
Heavy rain fell on the around midday on Wednesday, Sept. 19.
At around noon on Sept was under an County area small stream flood advisory which had been issued by the National Weather Se
The weather service
ported at 11:56 a.m. that heavy rain was expected to cause urban and small stream flooding in the advisory area.
At the time, the weather service reported that 1.5 inches of rain had fallen quickly in the Union County area. Another inch of rain was possible.
Flooding at the East Vienna Street location has been a concern for city officials for a number of years. City officials said they have met with State Rep. Terri Bryant, R-Murphysboro, to voice their con-
cerns about the situation. (continued on page 2)

Vehicle, pedestrian safety around railroad tracks promoted by Illinois State Police District 22

For the fifth consecutive year, Illinois State Police District 22 is partnering with local, state and federal hicle and pedestrian safety around railroad tracks and trains during Rail Safety Week, which is taking place Sept. 23-29.
To promote rail safety awareness and education and prevent injuries and fatalities, District 22 commander Capt. Michael Alvey has planned enforcement details throughout the week at various railroad grade crossings. Union County is in District 22. Drivers and pedestrians
who disobey the laws asociated with railroad grade crossings and railroad property will be cited, Alvey said in a news release. In addition to enforc ment efforts, the Illinois State Police also are com-
mitted to changing behavio through education.
Officers will be distribut ing literature to the public that contains rail safety information.
"When crossing railroad tracks, motorists must always obey the law and be aware of your surroundings," Alvey stated in a news release. "Please remember, it
is against the law to stop your vehicle on the railroad tracks and anywhere within the highway-rail grade crossing. "Highway-rail grade crossings are typically
marked by white stop lines located on the pavement in advance of the crossing, and if not marked by white stop lines, the highwayrail grade crossing extends from protective gate arm to protective gate arm.
"Please also remember it is against the law for pedestrians to go around a protective gate or disobey warning lights or bells." In 2017, there were over
,100 railroad crossing collisions involving motor vehicles nationwide, which resulted in over 800 injuries and over 270 fatalities. In 2017, there were over sions in Illinois involving motor vehicles; these collisions resulted in 29 injuries and 25 fatalities.
In addition, there were 46 trespassing incidents on railroad property in Illinois, which resulted in 26 injuries and 20 fatalities In 2017, Illinois ranked second in the nation in grade crossing fatalities and seventh in the nation in and seventh in the natio
trespassing fatalities.

90 percent of readers say their community newspaper keeps them informed

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. - Ninety percent of the more than 1,000 people responding to the National Newspaper Association's 2018 readership survey said that their community newspaper informs them. And 73 percent said that their hometown paper
provides valuable local shopping and advertising information. The poll was conducted for NNA by Susquehanna Polling and Research, which is based in Harrisburg, PA. In addition, 64 percent of survey respondents said they read a community newspaper either in print or online, which is
a small decline from last year's survey. When it comes to advertising, readers are most likely to trust and respond to ads they see in their community newspaper. purchasing and shopping decisions at local merchants, cited by 24 percent of respondents. Other less popular ad platforms include direct mailings, 18 percent, social media platforms; 16 percent, and in-store promotions; 13 percent. Readers of given. NNA has continually fought to keep public notices in newspapers, as one way to keep an eye on what the government is doing with taxpayers' money. According to the survey, respondents rated the importance of access to public notices a mean score of 5.72 on a 7 -point scale, including a combined 80 percent who give a high score of five, six or seven. Even As most publishers know, the people who read newspapers are the ones who are most likely to vote. When it comes to the coming mid-term elections, 84 percent of community newspaper readers are very likely to vote this year, compared
with only 61 percent of non-readers. Plus, 77 percent of community newspaper readers say they voted in the last election in with only 61 percent of non-readers. Plus, 77 percent of community newspaper readers say they voted in the last election in tend to be more politically active than non-readers. In fact, according to the survey, 86 percent of the respondents said they were either very likely or somewhat likely to vote in the next election.
For those newspapers working to get more political advertising in the coming elections, the survey notes that community
newspapers are cited by respondents as not only the most common go-to source to learn about political candidates running newspapers cions at 65 percent very or somewhat often, but also the most trusted with a 4.38 mean score on a 7 -point scale. In comparison, other less-popular sources of information to learn about local candidates include national network TV news, cited by 57 percent, cable TV news programs; 47 percent, talk radio; 36 percent; and social media platforms, 33 percent.
Additionally, 81 percent of community newspaper readers rely on local newspapers to learn about local candidates, far Additionall,
more than any other source. On the issue of trust, even non-readers of community newspapers trust community newspapers more than other sources, rating their overall trustworthiness a 3.71 mean score on a 7 -point: higher than any other news source.
Unfortunately, this is the first year where TV news edged out newspapers as the most prominent news medium that

behind at 32 percent. But that's only if you factor in cable, national outlets and TV websites. Without the added factors, newspapers without their websites were at 30 percent and TV news was at 29 percent.

"This legislation is the damage done by the closure of this facility and bringing economic opportunity to Hardin County and the sur rounding areas."

Senate Bill 3634 would allow the Illinois Depart-
ment of Corrections to sell the Hardin County Work Camp property to Hardin

County for $\$ 1$.

"The aim of this legislation is to empower Hardin County, placing the property in their control as local officials continue to seek out the funding needed to reopen the facility," Fowler said. Politics: ‘one of most interesting subjects for conversation’

Editor's note: this ar-
ticle features excerpts from a book titled "History of Union County." The book was in 1941 .

Politics has been one of the most interesting subjects for conversation since our country began.
Political parties developed as controversial mat ters arose in the country. At the time of the first elections in Union County the candidates were not elected because they adhered to opposing party principles due to the fact they were all Jeffersonians: or Republicans
The choice was made on the basis of personal likes and dislikes because population was not large and most of the settlers had heard of each other since nearly all of them had travelled over the same roads to

Each voter's name was placed on a new line and a record of his vote was opposite his name.
In 1822 the candidates and the number of votes cast for each Governor of Illinois were Thomas C. Brown 96, James B. Moore 9, Joseph Phillips 71, and Edward Coles 75; for Lieutenant Governor, John G. Lofton 22, A. F. Hubbard 65, James A. Peacock 26, and James Lemons 33; for Congress, John McLean 101, and Daniel P. Cook 157; for Senator, John Whitaker 81 , John Grammer 162, R. E. Wibb 0; for Reprenry L John Mcintosh 138 P. Field 136, Jome Alex . Field 136, James P. Ed 107, and John Huns 107, and John Hunsak Hunsaker 220 werge S. names of the two leading candidates for each office. All of the freeholders, that is, people owning land were allowed to vote at that time. There were 235 voters in the 1822 election. In 1850 all free men were allowed to vote but colored men were not allowed to vote until after the Civil War.
This system of voting was used until 1850. It was easy to see that a man kept his promise to vote for a certain candidate in those days. An amusing incident is related about a voter in Johnson County who wished to vote for Lincoln, which shows how the judges and clerks helped elect their own candidate. It is possible that no such corrupt practice ever existed in Union County.
It seems that it was generally known that a certain voter was a supporter of Abraham Lincoln and the judges and clerks of the election were opposed to Lincoln.
When the voter came to the polls to cast his vote the judges and clerks ignored him and he was forced to go away without being heard. However he met an influential man in the neighborhood who returned to the polls with him and insisted that his

 abolish state boards, eliminates nepotismissued Sept. 21 by Gov. cal issues address ethiBruce Rauner to abolish 53 boards and commissions that he said serve no public purpose and have been inactive for years, some for as long as two full decades. "This is a matter of good government through transparency," Rauner said in a news release.
"The people of Illinois need to understand the ongoing work of the state. They should not be led to believe that people are still at work doing tasks that were completed 10 years ago, or that they are supporting advisory roles for which the need expired in the 1990s.
Over the years, the State of Illinois has created more than 600 authorities boards, bureaus, commissions, committees, councils, task forces and other similar entities
Many of them have completed their work and no longer operate, yet they still appear in state pub lications, public-facing websites and Legislative Research Unit reports as if they were still doing the people's work
The executive orders issued on Sept. 21 follow another order which the governor issued earlier this year to abolish 19 othe moribund entities
Collectively, the orders eliminate 72 redundant or inactive boards and commissions so that executive branch operations are more transparent and efficient, the governor said
One of the organizations that Rauner eliminated Sept. 21, the State Government Accountability Council, was formed in 1999 and there isn't any recorded activity since that time. Another, the Illinois

## World issues and their impact here at home

A front page headline in last Monday's New York Times reads "China, Facing U.S. Hostility, Vows to Come Out Swinging." Of course, most of our readers do not directly import goods from China, but this relationship, which could evolve into a major trade war affects each of us.
It is easy to overlook the extent to which we are economically interconnected. I suspect that most of you can look within your own home and find furniture or other items produced in another country. For me that applies to looking in my refrigerator

The latest proposal by our president would place a $\$ 200$ billion tax on imports from China. The Chinese response could take one of two paths, or a combination of both. The first would be to simply pass along this extra cost to U.S. consumers, which would immediately increase the cost of your next computer, TV or other electrical devices that depend on Chinese imports.

The second path would be to place an equivalent tax on items imported into China. This would risk a significant drop of sales by U.S. firms and ultimately result in a drop in U.S. employment opportunities.
Some will argue that if we tax the imports, we would simply shift to purchasing products of U.S. manufacture. While there would be some of this, history does show the likelihood of a net gain for U.S. consumers.
Since it is far easier in the world of internet for ordinary citizens to follow and assess trade issues, I would encourage more people to do so and to advise your elected officials how you would have them vote. It does make a difference.
