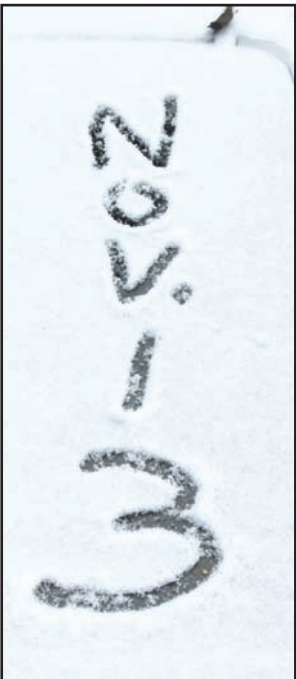

Weather service issues winter storm watch

UPDATED: The National Weather Service office in Paducah on Tuesday afternoon issued a winter storm watch for the region.

The watch area includes parts of Southern Illinois, Southeast Missouri and Western Kentucky.

A winter storm watch means there is potential for significant snow, sleet or ice accumulations that may impact travel, the weather service stated.

The winter storm watch was slated to begin Wednesday afternoon and continues through Thursday afternoon, today.

The weather service advised that "heavy mixed precipitation" is possible.

Total snow accumulations of 2 to 5 inches are possible. Ice accumulations of around one-tenth of an inch also are possible.

The highest snow accumulations are expected over

parts of Southern Illinois, Southeast Missouri and part of the Purchase Area of Western Kentucky.

"Plan on slippery road conditions Wednesday night and Thursday morning. The hazardous conditions could impact the morning or evening commute," the weather service stated.

Union County residents may get to see some more wintry weather this week.

A light dusting of snow fell on the area late Monday night and early Tuesday morning.

The National Weather Service office in Paducah reported early Tuesday that "confidence in accumulating snowfall late Wednesday and Thursday continues to increase and is now high."

"It will most likely snow over much of the region Wednesday night into

Thursday," the weather service reported on its website.

"How much and what areas will see the most still have to be determined."

The weather service reported that light snow was expected to spread north across the region Wednesday evening, becoming mixed with light freezing rain at times late Wednesday night into Thursday morning.

Flag re-dedication ceremony held in Cobden

On the traditional Armistice Day of Nov. 11, a ceremony was held in Cobden to honor the American flag.

A flag was rededicated at the former American Legion Post No. 259 building in the Union County village. The building is now owned by Todd Dietterle and Tracy Dillard in Cobden.

Those representing the American Legion at the ceremony included Red Beckley, Jeff Lingle, Rick Lingle and Tom Widdows.

The ceremony recalled on how on the 11th day of the 11th month at the 11th hour of the morning in the year of 1918, an armistice was signed which ended "The Great War," now known as World War I.

Those who gathered exactly 100 years later for the Cobden ceremony recalled how they were honoring the flag "which symbolizes the men and women and their sacrifices of that war and all wars before or after for our homeland."

A message shared at the ceremony further stated that: "We, the people of the United States, and Cobden, Illinois, are gathered today to honor and rededicate our beloved flag, which will soon fly again on the same pole where it flew for over 70 years...as a symbol of our unity as one people from many people, E Pluribus Unum, in the ideals of freedom and democracy, where all people are created equal, and say, in the words of President Lincoln, 'We high resolve that...this nation under God, shall have a new birth of freedom... and that government of the people, by the people, for the people shall not perish from the earth...' and to this we say, 'Amen.'"

"Accordingly...Let 'Old Glory,' our 'Star-Spangled Banner,' wave again."

The ceremony also included a presentation of arms/order arms, and the singing of "God Bless America."

Some snow and light ice accumulations were expected, which will likely cause travel impacts.

Precipitation will transition to all rain across most of the region by Thursday afternoon.

Winter officially starts on Dec. 21.

Here's a look at the forecast which had been posted on the website at the time that the paper was going to press on Tuesday morning:

Wednesday night: Snow after 7 p.m., mixing with freezing rain after 3 a.m. Low around 28. North northeast wind 6 to 8 miles per hour. The chance of precipitation was 80 percent.

Thursday (today): Snow, possibly mixed with freez-

ing rain before noon, then snow, possibly mixed with rain. High near 35. North wind around 7 mph. Chance of precipitation is 80 percent.

Thursday night: Chance of snow and freezing rain before 7 p.m. Partly cloudy, with a low around 26. Southwest wind around 6 mph. Chance of precipitation is 50 percent.

Friday: Sunny, with a high near 45. Southwest wind around 6 mph.

Saturday is expected to be mostly sunny, with a high near 48.

The outlook for Sunday calls for partly sunny conditions, with a high near 41.

A slight chance of snow is in the forecast for Sunday night and Monday.

The scripture reading from the Old and New Testament will be read by G. Wallace Rich. The Meditation will be given by Dr. Wm. H. Whiting. The breakfast will be terminated no later than 7:45 a.m. with the Benediction by Billy Dillow.

The Rev. Ben Hunter, Laymen adviser and member of the Ministerial Alliance, says a good attendance is expected.

that this will become an annual event since an interdenominational meeting such as this is in keeping with the Ecumenical spirit.

College assessment completed

The Higher Learning Commission, HLC, recently completed its two-day assessment of Shawnee Community College as part of a review to reaffirm the college's accreditation.

Accreditation review is a practice conducted periodically to ensure academic and institutional standards are being met within HLC guidelines.

The HLC process includes evaluation in areas such as planning, instruction modalities, student

learning outcomes, and student success.

The evaluation team met with students, faculty and staff in individual and open sessions to discuss the institution's plan for increasing opportunities for students and ensuring student success.

The college reported that the HLC findings will be made available to the institution for review in approximately four to six weeks from the time of the visit.

Rural health care highlighted

Union County Hospital honored for excellence in quality of care outcomes

The Illinois Critical Access Hospital Network, ICAHN, recently recognized Union County Hospital in Anna for its ongoing commitment to exceptional quality of care.

As part of the federal Office of Rural Health Policy Medicare Beneficiary Quality Improvement Program, MBQIP, Union County Hospital and other critical access hospitals were asked to voluntarily participate in four defined domains of quality outcomes.

The four domains include patient safety/inpatient, patient engagement, care transitions and outpatient measures.

Election results noted at regular meeting of county commissioners

The 2018 general election was on the minds of those who attended last Friday morning's regular meeting of the Union County Board of Commissioners.

About 20 people attended the meeting, which was held at the Union County Courthouse in Jonesboro.

Some of those in attendance were newly elected, and reelected Union County officials.

More than 60 percent of the county's eligible voters cast ballots in the Tuesday, Nov. 6, general election.

Records showed that 7,662 Union County voters cast ballots in the general election. The total represented 63.33 percent of the county's 12,098 registered voters.

The 2018 general election in Union County was highlighted by Republican Party wins in contested local races.

Here's a look at how voting went in county races:

Union County Clerk: Republican challenger Lance M. Meisenheimer defeated Democrat Vonda Benefield, who was the incumbent. Meisenheimer tallied 4,191 votes. Benefield had 3,299.

Union County Treasurer: Republican Leigh Burns defeated Democrat John L. Hughey by a margin

of 4,552 to 2,897. The incumbent treasurer, Darren Bailey, did not run for reelection.

Union County Sheriff: Democrat Scott Harvel, the incumbent, unopposed. Harvel received 6,300 votes.

Union County Commissioner, Seat A, Six-Year Term: Republican Kent L. Pitts won with 3,731 votes. Democrat Tina Waller received 3,187 votes. Independent Jesse T. Adams received 527 votes.

Union County Commissioner, Seat C, Six-Year Term: Republican David S. Gould, who was an incumbent, received 4,318 votes. Democrat Kevin L. Starr received 3,037 votes.

For Union County Commissioner, Seat D, Six-Year Term: Republican Max Miller, who was an incumbent, received 3,948 votes. Democrat Thomas Sadowski received 3,438 votes.

As Friday morning's meeting got underway, Union County Board of Commissioners chairman Bobby Toler Jr. recognized those who had won in the Nov. 6 election, including Meisenheimer, Pitts, Gould and Miller.

Candidate Sadowski voiced appreciation to county commissioner Dan-

ny Hartline for his service. Hartline chose not to seek reelection this year. Sadowski said he hoped that those who won election will keep the best interests of the county in mind as they take office.

Candidate Starr echoed Sadowski's comments. Starr urged those who were elected to move forward and do what is best for Union County.

Earthquake exercise conducted

The Illinois National Guard conducted a five-day complex catastrophe exercise dubbed Prairie Assurance from Oct. 31 to Nov. 4.

The exercise trained elements of a joint task force from the Illinois Army and Air National Guard to rapidly respond to a major earthquake in Southern Illinois.

The exercise simulated a 7.8 magnitude earthquake event centered on the New Madrid Seismic Zone.

The exercise took place at the 183rd Wing and the Joint Forces Headquarters in Springfield.

Representatives from the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, IEMA, and the Civil Air Patrol also participated in the exercise.

Approximately 100 members from the Air National Guard's 183rd Air Operations Group and the Army National Guard's 65th Troop Command participated in the exercise.

The two units were tasked to form a standing joint task force in 2013 and regularly train together in order to prepare for major disasters.

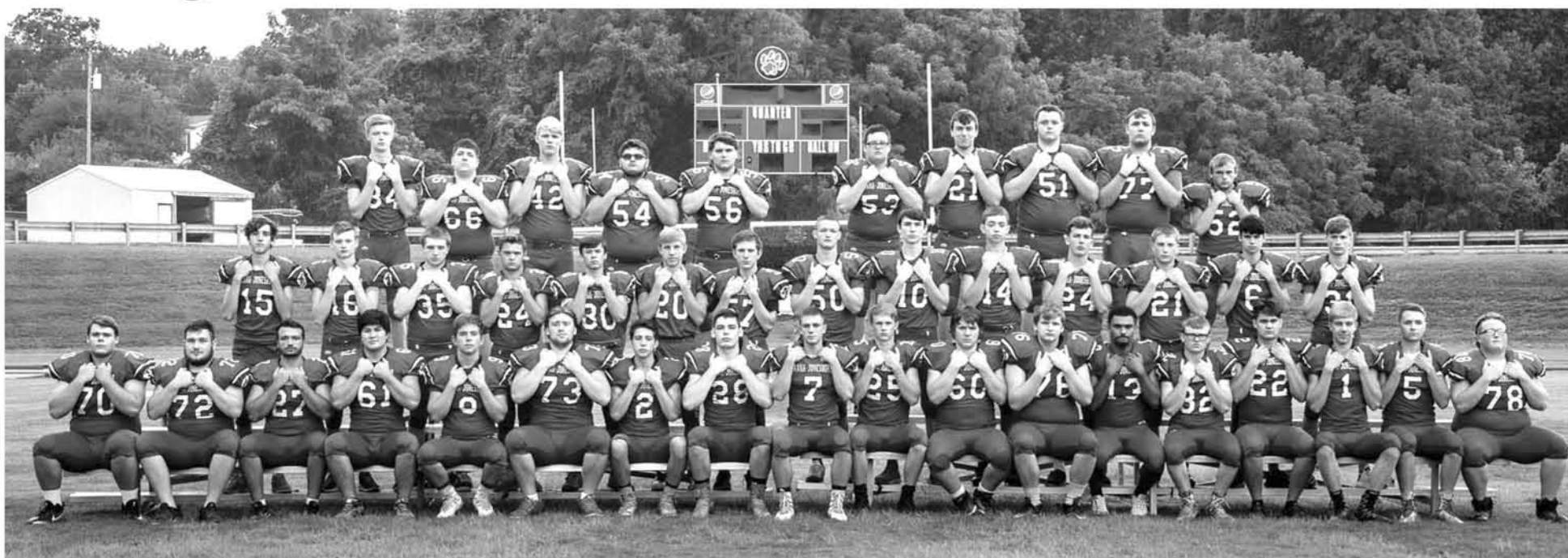

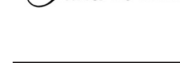

Illinois state lawmakers back in Capitol for fall veto session

As lawmakers prepared to return to Springfield, State Sen. Dale Fowler, R-Harrisburg, provided an update about the upcoming scheduled fall veto session.

State senators and representatives planned to be back at the Capitol in Springfield beginning Nov. 13 to consider 37 separate pieces of legislation passed during the spring session, but amended or rejected by the governor during the summer.

Fowler said the governor used his amendatory veto authority to change 13 bills and executed total veto actions on 24 other measures.

Legislative measures on the veto session agenda include, business regulations, insurance, taxation, legal reforms, immigration, voter integrity standards, education, natural resources and the environment.

In other news, First Lady Diana Rauner is leading an effort to provide holiday cheer for Illinois members of the military.

The 2018 Holiday Hero Drive sends holiday cards and socks to Illinois service men and women, including those currently overseas.

The drive is in partnership with the United Service Organizations, USO, of Illinois, the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs, IDVA, and the Illinois Governor's Mansion Association.

Cards and socks also can be dropped off at one of more than 80 local Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs, IDVA, veteran service office locations around the state.

IDVA runs 49 full-time and 35 part-time offices in 80 of Illinois' 102 counties.

According to the board's website, eligible districts are those that exceed a threshold tax rate and that agree to abate a portion of taxes, up to a statutory limit, in the coming tax cycle.

In return, qualifying districts may receive a state grant in an amount that is a proportion of the tax relief provided.

The threshold tax rate will be determined based on applications received by ISBE.

The application period will end at 4 p.m. on Jan. 7, 2019. No late submissions will be accepted. More information can be found online at ISBE.net.

Illinois firearm deer hunting season set to open Nov. 16-18

Deer hunters are reminded to focus on safety as the 2018 Illinois firearm deer season opens this week.

The seven-day firearm season begins Friday, Nov. 16, through Sunday, Nov. 18, with a second round of firearm deer hunting scheduled Nov. 29 through Dec. 2.

"Our firearm deer weekends are Illinois' most popular hunting season, and amid all the excitement of the season, we want to remind hunters that safe hunting is the best hunting," said Illinois Department of Natural Resources, IDNR, director Wayne Rosenthal in a news release.

"Illinois' hunting safety record is a good one, but even one hunting incident involving injuries or fatalities is one too many."

The IDNR Office of Law Enforcement, which administers the Illinois hunter safety education program, reports there were 19 hunting incidents last year during all seasons, three of which involved fatalities.

Ten of those incidents involved hunters falling from elevated tree stands or falling while climbing into or out of tree stands.

IDNR safety educators remind hunters using tree stands to use a Fall Arrest System, FAS, safety harness.

Nationally, more than 80 percent of reported tree stand incidents involve hunters who were not using a fall restraint system.

As additional precautions, hunters are advised to check the harness, straps, ladder and other equipment

to make sure they are in good working order.

Hunters also are advised to be aware of weather conditions that could make stands and steps slippery, and to have a mobile phone within reach to call for help, if needed.

Hunters can review tree stand safety online at <http://www.huntercourse.com/treestandsafety/>

Safety educators and IDNR Conservation Police also remind everyone hunting with a firearm to:

- Treat every firearm as if it is loaded, and never assume a firearm is unloaded.

- Always point a firearm in a safe direction.

- Be sure of the target, and make sure there are no other hunters, homes, buildings, vehicles or other animals beyond the target.

- Keep your finger out of the trigger guard and off the trigger until they are ready to shoot.

Legal hunting hours for the firearm deer season are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Hunters who take a deer during the firearm season in most Illinois counties must register the deer they harvest online, or through the toll-free phone check-in system.

To register their harvest by phone, hunters can call 1-866-IL-CHECK (1-866-452-4325).

The online deer registration system is available at <https://www.dnr.illinois.gov/hunting/Pages/HarvestReporting.aspx>.

Hunters registering deer through the online or phone

systems must do so by 10 p.m. on the day they take the deer.

In addition to the seven-day Illinois firearm deer season on Nov. 16-18 and Nov. 29-Dec. 2, other deer hunting seasons in the state include the three-day muzzleloader-only deer season on Dec. 7-9, and the seven-day late-winter firearm antlerless-only deer season and special CWD deer season (in select counties) on Dec. 27-30 and Jan. 18-20, 2019.

The Illinois archery deer season, which opened on Oct. 1, is open through Jan. 20, 2019 (the season is closed in counties open to firearm deer season on Nov. 16-18 and Nov. 29-Dec. 2).

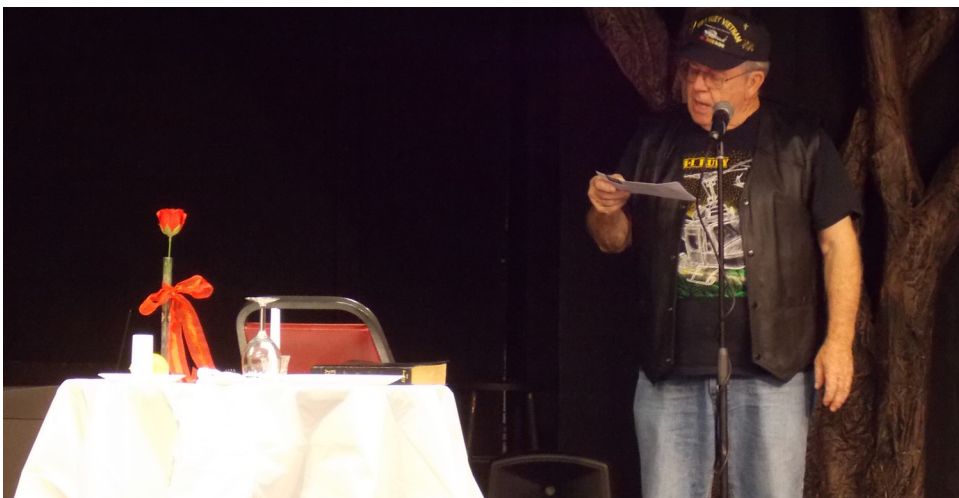

Illinois and the Slavery Issue

When Illinois Territory was divided from the Indiana Territory, the laws of the former were adopted by Illinois as a beginning point to establish its own government. One of those laws regarded indenture-ship, the magic bullet that allowed for slavery in disguise.

The states that came from the Northwest Territory, those north of the Ohio River and East of the Mississippi River, were still governed by the no slavery law that existed since the Northwest Ordinance of 1787 was instituted. Illinois, in particular, found difficulty abiding entirely by the law concerning slavery. The Indiana law that Illinois inherited made it possible for the territory to disguise and tolerate slavery by calling it indentureship.

Missouri was also in the process of making its own request for statehood. That state wanted to enter the union as a slave state. Without going into a long discussion on the slavery issue west of the Mississippi River, they were officially not allowed to be a slave state when entering the union. In a bit of legislation proposed by Henry Clay of Kentucky, the Missouri Compromise was created which would allow that territory to enter the union as a slave state. Although the compromise had not taken

place at the time Illinois wanted to become a state, there was a rivalry between the two territories over which would become a state first. For the reader's information, Missouri did not become a state until 1821.

The issue of slavery being allowed in Missouri, even as a territory, and Illinois having to disguise its slavery, created a discussion in which slavery came to the front as an issue to consider in the new constitution to come. Although Illinois would not be allowed to be a slave state and enter the union because of the Northwest Ordinance of 1787, there was open discussion on how slavery could still exist in Illinois.

There were those who said that Illinois could enter the union as a non-slave state and after statehood was granted, then the new state could change its own laws and become a slave state. This idea gained ground quickly among the pro-slavery group.

The slavery issue was finally settled in 1824. A close vote finally defeated the pro-slavery group. The map below shows the counties and how they voted.

Those counties voting "for slavery" are shown in black, those voting "against slavery" are shown in white.

This last week Americans recognized the end of World War I, Nov. 11, 1918, commonly referenced in history books as "The Great War."

Millions of Europeans died in this conflict, along with large numbers of Americans who sailed across the Atlantic to join in. Others sustained wounds physical and mental with which they lived the rest of their lives. Maps in Europe were redrawn and large parts of industry and millions of homes were destroyed.

While it is right to recognize the significant sacrifices made by those who wore our uniform, as one who spent 34 years in the U.S. Army in peace and war, I am hesitant to call any war "great."

War is in virtually every case a failure of man and politics to resolve problems without killing. While I can honor those who chose to put on uniforms to protect their families and homeland, after centuries of brutal warfare I have to believe we can do better.

Men and now women who take up arms to defend their country carry on a tradition that has gone on for centuries. However, in a time of superior access to information and communication, we must do better.

As a soldier I attended schools on how to assure victory over potential opponents, but was far less exposed to the lessons of history where war was avoided.

I hope this is the challenge of the rising generation and that their success in this effort will lead to future celebrations of wars which were never fought.

This past week, as a retired soldier, I have frequently heard the kind greeting: "Thank you for your service to our nation." I hope in the future that greeting is equally shared with those who have prevented nations from going to war.

The quake which ran through 19 states...was thought at first to be centered near New Madrid, Mo., the heart of the disastrous 1811 quake, which changed the course of the Mississippi River.

Later authorities said it was located 120 miles southeast of St. Louis, in southern Illinois near the Indiana border. The National Earthquake Center in Washington now has pin-pointed the center of the tremor to have been between Marion and Harrisburg. The quake registered 5.5 on the 10-point Richter scale, just under 6 which is generally called the damage point.

The residents of Union County reacted in many and, by this time, humorous ways to the tremor.
